On Wednesday 31st January year 12 students watched an amazing presentation from Leicestershire Fire and Rescue Service called 'Fatal4'. This annual visit focused on the dangers of driving and the main causes of accidents, including speeding and use of mobile phones. This hard-hitting presentation comes at a very appropriate time for year 12s as they turn 17 this academic year and begin driving. In addition, students had the opportunity to take part in a virtual reality experience showing exactly what happens during a collision. The whole experience will hopefully stay with our students and ensure that when they do pass their driving test they become safe and responsible road users.

COMMUNITY PLANTING EVENT

We have been very fortunate to have secured a grant to establish a 200m hedgerow along the southern boundary of the College thanks to funding from The Tree Council's Branching Out Fund. Branching Out provides grants ranging from £250 to £2,500 to community groups, schools, small registered charities and Tree Warden Networks seeking to establish trees, hedgerows, and orchards throughout the winter planting season.

We are lucky to already have resident muntjac deer, squirrels, rabbits and a barn own at MV16 and we hope to further provide for wildlife and enhance the biodiversity of the College grounds.

We now need everyone's help to plant our hedgerow and invite you all to come and dig in! Student planting day will be Friday 15th March for MV16 and BW16 students and staff. Then on Saturday 16th March everyone who has a connection to MV is invited to join us. Families and children are welcome. Just bring boots and a spade! Hot drinks and cakes will be offered to all who help us on the day. We are also asking for donations of tree bark chippings from local tree surgeons and contractors and the site is ready to receive them now in preparation for the planting weekend.

The Tree Council Grants Officer, Geraldine Creaven said: "Branching Out presents a fantastic opportunity for schools and community grounds large and small to get their spades in the ground and start establishing life-enhancing and biodiversity boosting trees, hedgerows, and orchards in their neighbourhoods. "We're so thrilled for all our successful applicants, especially MV16!"

WHO DO YOU THINK YOU ARE?

Ms Kuczynska delivered a lecture this week to year 13 students entitled "Who do you think I am?" The lecture was based on her mother's deportation from Poland to Siberia in 1940 as a 9-year-old child. Coping with the loss of her parents and relying on the kindness of strangers, she described the odyssey from Poland to Russia, Karachi and finally Valivade in India, where she spent five years in school. Traumatic yes, but ultimately the story left us with the sense of triumph of the human spirit in the most adverse conditions.

STUDENT UNION

The MV16 student union continues to raise its profile across the college with a number of events in February. Firstly, they are coordinating our celebration of LGBTQ+ History Month by identifying and sharing stories of historical figures from the LGBTQ+ community whose journey can inspire all of our students. In addition, as part of raising both awareness of their work and funds for them to carry out future projects, the student union sold Valentine's roses and gift bags of chocolates. These activities help foster an even stronger sense of community across our college and will be continued by our new student union president, who will be elected in the summer term.
